# Commitment to the COVID-19 Pledge – Foundation Leader Perspectives Interview Protocol

#### **Background**

During recent months, we have been living through a global health pandemic and resulting economic crisis, which has highlighted ongoing inequities in our society. Among them, long-standing issues of racial justice have come to the forefront due to more recent murders of several Black men and women people by the police. **CEP is conducting a study to understand how foundations are responding to these times.** 

In the spring of 2020, as the negative effects of the COVID-19 pandemic on nonprofit organizations were becoming apparent, hundreds of foundations, yours included, <u>pledged</u> to act with urgency to support your nonprofit partners as well as the people and communities hit hardest by the impacts of COVID-19. (*Please see the appendix for the 8 elements of the pledge*)

The actions proposed in the pledge are not new, but may be increasingly necessary to help nonprofit organizations weather the current moment. CEP seeks to understand foundations' experiences implementing the elements of the pledge and, more broadly, their philanthropic responses to the present public health, economic, and social crises. This study will also examine whether changes to grantmaking strategy made in response to the current moment will be permanently implemented. It is our hope that this research will inform field-wide discussions and foundation-specific efforts.

The rapid spread of COVID-19 has created a global health and economic crisis that is testing every one of us. We know that the shocks of this "new normal" are severe and unanticipated for our sector and grantee partners.

As leaders in philanthropy, we recognize the critical need to act with fierce urgency to support our nonprofit partners as well as the people and communities hit hardest by the impacts of COVID-19.

We invite funders and other leaders in the philanthropic sector to join us in making these commitments and collectively holding ourselves accountable to them by signing this pledge of action. Specifically, signatories pledge to the following:

- 1. Loosen or eliminate the restrictions on current grants. This can include: converting project-based grants to unrestricted support; accelerating payment schedules; and not holding grantees responsible if conferences, events, and other project deliverables must be postponed or canceled.
